MISSION FURNITURE.

The Seats are in all cases 11 inches wide, and $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches thick. Height of seat, $16\frac{1}{2}$ inches from floor, and 2 feet 8 inches from floor to top of back rail. Nos. 1, 4, 5, 6 are 2 inch thick ends; 2 and 3 are $2\frac{1}{4}$ ends. Book-rest can be fixed to back of either seat, as shown in No. 1, at 2/6 per seat extra.

Nos. 1 and 6, 2/6 per foot for 9-feet lengths.

Nos. 2, 3, 4, and 5, 3/2 per foot for 9-feet lengths.

Kneeling Desks, No. 7, out of $11 \times 1\frac{1}{2}$ inch deal, 24 inches wide, and 30 inches high, 18/- each.

No. 8, ditto, with extra Book-board, 21/- each.

Lectern, No. 9, Book-board 15 inches wide, 48 inches high, 20/- each.

The above prices are quoted for Plain Deal; Pitch-pine, 20 per cent. extra; Oak, 40 per cent. extra. Seats could be stained Oak colour and Varnished, 6d. per foot extra.
